Goals and Objectives of the course:

Now is an amazing time to study global economics. In addition to the issues always in play, the current Greek crisis and the Russian/Ukraine crisis—still evolving as the course begins—the prospects for the global economy of the Iran Nuclear negotiations will begin to emerge. China's global influence is uncertain but increasing. Being in Italy at the center of all the drama is an invaluable opportunity to experience the implications in person. This course will examine the economics of these global events from the perspective of theory conditioned by the political practicalities that drive them.

The biggest advantage of studying at CIMBA is the personal attention available to each of you for consultation with me as often as you want. There are no limits to the open door that I have while in Italy. I get to know you in ways that are invaluable for letters of recommendation when they are needed.

The course is divided into four sections. Section One examines the structure of global economic events.

Section Two presents the traditional trade analysis. This examination reveals several problems that arise in "free" trade which leads to the next section.

Section Three examines the traditional solution of quotas, tariffs and subsidies.

Section Four examines the payments system, exchange rate determination and how these institutions are used to constrain nations that don't play by the accepted rules of the Global Economy.

Each of these sections will incorporate aspects of economic life in Greece, Russia/Ukraine and the Middle East based on information in the financial and political press. The class will be organized in groups to research these regions and their particular issues

Grades will be based upon a midterm Exam, a Final Exam and class participation. Exam times are specified in the daily class schedule included in the study guide. Grades will follow the University of Iowa guidelines. Having taught this course often, I determine grades base on a "curve" rather than an absolute point spread. Doing so means that "variance" due to instructor is removed from the grade determination process. Explanation of the process will be given on the first day of class discussion.
